Blood & Honour Rumania - The Chronicles

Comrades,

This here magazine speaks up for the progress Blood & Honour has been making for the last couple of years in Rumania. It's the real story counting both ups and downs of our local unit. Without lies, nor exaggeration, just the pure facts.

We must stress that many statements written in this magazine are illegal in Rumania as well as in some other countries in Europe, so please be careful whom you share the story with. Before we do let everybody in on our upbringing as an organisation, we would like to thank division heads from the Netherlands and Ukraine for their fantastic support. Last, but not least, we thank you for buying this. So here goes.

The word says the first skinheads to emerge in Rumania came from the city of Reghin, where a bunch of cropped youngsters made the headlines in mid 90's. It was about some arsons, beatings and likes. Such deeds were actually quite common after the 1989 anti-communist revolution as many white Rumanians took action against local gypsies because of the latter's anti-social behaviour. In the long run though the aliens got more rights because the resistance was poorly organised for the most part whilst ZOG hurried to take over. That's also why skinhead nests such as the ones in Reghin or Miercurea Ciuc, which were predominantly formed by ethnic Germans or Hungarians anyway, didn't make any difference and eventually disbanded.

It follows that the actual movement starts in Timisoara city on a Serbian network. Initially, there were just some violent teens spreading terror all over the place, but for the first time Rumanian skinheads teamed up with ethnic Serbians, Germans and Hungarians. It was past the mid 90s and several contacts with National

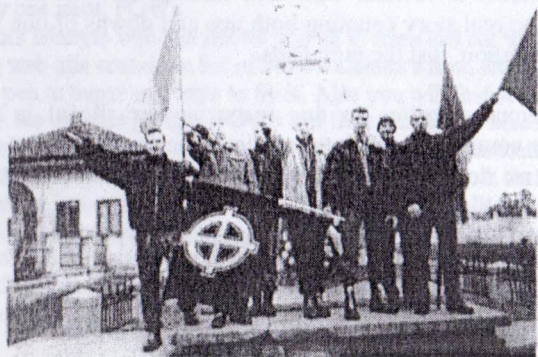


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Socialists from the capital Bucharest but also other cities like Pitesti for example were being made, a couple of zines were released, meetings were taking place and little by little skinheads became a wide-spread phenomenon, even though in some areas there were just two or even a single individual. Generally speaking, everybody knew each other and it came time to make it all official, but religion would always be a problem.



Needless to say, many people went away as easy as they came, you can still see some of them flying the flags on the football terraces but that's all they are capable of doing, while the die-hard racials stayed and got organised. Thus, the Christian branch of Timisoara skinheads went in with religious youth national-

chauvinist organisation Noua Dreaptă, which is centred in the capital Bucharest and today they even have gypsy members and leaders. Some of the remaining skins linked up with the few heathens from Bucharest and Pitesti, who were accepted in the Brotherhood on December 1st, 2001, which by the way proudly happened together with Rumania's 83rd national day.



Timisoara boys would never become full members of the organisation though, cause of different reasons like the long distance in the first place, then most of them being busy with mandatory military service, going abroad to find better-paid jobs etc. But they have always stood by us and helped us with logistics whenever they could

afford it. Here I'll mention 2 Rumanian editions of our zine and several other CD and tape printings. Our gratitude goes out especially to Dragan, Alex and Alin.

In any case, the unit itself was led by Cezar and Kătană, two Moldavians for those who want to know, whose families settled down in Bucharest several years ago, and it counted up to 10 members. Also, there were 5 people in Pitesti who have always kept in touch by mail or phone and met with the others from time to time.

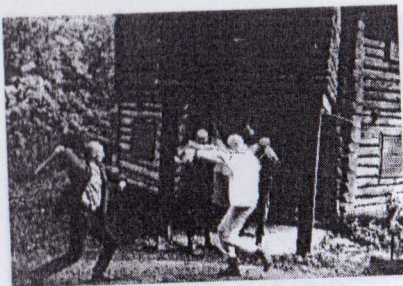
The first step forward was to release a zine, which had been in the works since late 2000, but it took so long cause almost all bands and parties we tried and contacted not only they didn't believe there really were skinheads in Rumania, but everybody thought we weren't even fucking white because of the gypsy immigrants, who just happened to be citizens of our country thanks to you know who, and gave us all a bad name in Germany and all around Europe. But that's a total different story and everybody should know the truth by now! If you don't, well, then fuck off!



So came out 'Impact 14' and we made our first contacts with foreign divisions by introducing that very sample. The highlights of this photocopied zine were as it follows: the interview with America's NO ALIBI and an article called "Be Consistent!" which addressed against so called ns black-metal trend! We know there are decent comrades in black-metal underground, but the ones in Rumania are really pathetic, so the article couldn't have worked better. The zine was successfully sold in approximately 50 copies, but we had to stop distributing it out in the open when the new race law was endorsed in the spring of 2002. So we had to go underground...



Shortly, the race decree forbids public exhibit of our symbols, revisionist propaganda, like "holohoax" denial for example, the praise of war criminals, which is the label they use when referring to our heroes and martyrs, the law says that even the meeting of a small group of at least three persons who would discuss racist issues, is a criminal act, imagine that! One can get from 5 to 15 years in jail when caught founding or being a member of a ns organisation. Just wearing a racist t-shirt throws one in jail for 6 months to 5 years. So there you have it. Hopefully, they haven't started getting on us yet, probably because they don't want to make a big fuss about it, not when the elections are coming up anyway, or they are too busy kissing Bush's ass and sending young boys to die for him and his jewish masters in Afghanistan, but the law is there and it can always be enforced on us. Statues of WW2 marshal Antonescu had been taken down and lots of books withdrawn from stores though.



There are a couple of other people on trial, but it seems to go on forever. Also, an ethnic Hungarian skinhead was incarcerated for killing a homeless gypsy kid, some fines had to be paid to police for street violence, but that's about it.

As for Blood & Honour, it was going to be the first internal change and several others would follow. So when the winds started to blow, cry-babies hurried up back home to their 9 til 5 way of life. Being a skinhead was too tough for them. But a few daring men went on carefully avoiding the law. Of course, there wasn't a real organised unit anymore, but instead only three people did all of the job,

while the rest simply limited to hang out in pubs with us and buy our products. From time to time discussions about getting our chapter back on its feet again were being held, but nothing ever happened.

In June 2002, we released a new zine called "vOInta!" (which is Rumanian for "the will" as in "the Triumph of..."). It featured interviews with the British division, Micetrap distro from the United States, an article on motherhood written by a Canadian skin-girl, 1st chapter of Skrewdriver - First ten Years by Joe Pearce, and of course different reviews. It was distributed for free in over 150 copies. We'd like to take this opportunity to thank a special bon-bin girl from Timisoara who drew the cover for us and all other (un)tamed valkyries for inspiration. You know who you are.

At the same time we also released three audio-tapes, Symphony of Sorrow - "Paradise Lost", Storm - "... for Blood and Honour" and a compilation featuring 4 Serbian B&H bands. Each tape was sold in over 50 copies so far. Not much, but still enough for Rumania at this moment.



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That summer our "number one" had to go in the Army and so did other comrades. You can read all about Cezar's experience as a private in Finland's Voice! magazine #10. Things got difficult having our best men busy with either the Army or full-time jobs, and so meetings took place hardly ever as months passed. Then fucking Combat 18 pumped up in Bucharest. Nobody knew who they were or where did they come from. Being just a few skinheads in the city, everybody knew each other of course, so it was quite a blow to see a brand new gang making trouble around. Of course they talked shit about us and everybody else in the nationalist scene for that matter, made threats and all in all followed the usual c18 party line. At first, everybody took them seriously, but in the long run they turned out to be just some teens tricking people on the Internet. We met them once and took them in for questioning. Most of them weren't even skinheads, nor did they value Ian Stuart, nor did they even know who our mentor was, they were just a bunch of bastards who didn't know anything about how the world goes, and still they dared to use the name of Blood & Honour which they accidentally found on the net. Later after education a couple of them dumped c18 and became valuable members of the true B&H. The rest simply scattered away or probably there are some leftovers clinging to their evil nazi image online.

In October 2002, our second issue came out. It featured interviews with Swedish Vikings STORM, BNS (Bulgarian Nationalist Union), an article on womanhood, short story Pitesti unit in Rumania and of course the Skrewdriver series. It was sold in about 100 copies, which was fairly good, especially that we even got a reasonable number of subscriptions for future issues.

In May 2003, our third issue came through, this time professionally printed thanks to our comrades in the Netherlands, who helped financially. It featured interviews with British division once again, Brigade M, Stormwolf, B&H Serbia, the Skrewdriver series and reviews of course. Also, there was a poster with Tim Mudde, bass player of Brigade M. The zine was printed in 200 copies and is now sold out.

All this time, the army boys did their best and got days off from the service just to assist our struggle and it's mostly thanks to Cezar and the rest of the guys that we managed to release a second and third issue, kept contacts one with each other, and grew to be the organisation we are today. Also, we can't disregard ongoing efforts made by Daniel from Pitesti and Marian from Bucharest who took care of things while the others served in the Army or elsewhere. Unfortunately, the latter, Marian, didn't go all the way with us as he was up to here with putting money in

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our products and getting none back, seems like he thought everything was just a fucking business, and considering his low financial condition of his family, he

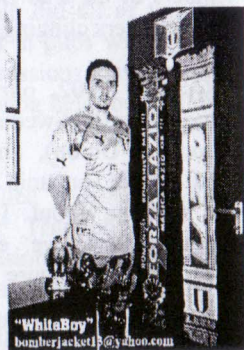


moved out. Our opinion is there can't be any reason to leave the scene, no matter how hard it is, one should always stand by what he believes in. We thought a lot before posting this traitor's story here (because that's what he is, especially when he left the scene with his pockets full of fee-payers' cash), we don't want you to misinterpret our intent, we don't settle scores here, that guy is not

important now, but we promised to tell you the whole story, and that's what we're doing. It was difficult to win over people in sending more cash in, after they learnt that the collector they did trust actually ran away with the money. We'd like to thank people who sold books, shirts, CDs from their own collection to help us get over the situation, it's with them we went on as a division again.



Last summer Rumania was supposed to finally make it to the worldwide skinhead map by setting up a gig with Brigade M from



the Netherlands, but some people failed to appreciate the importance of the event and it never happened. We had to cancel it just two days before the Dutch should have come here for nothing. Once gain, we'd like to apologize to Tim & Co. and thank them for understanding.

Not everything was lost though, because Erik of the Dutch division visited us and it meant a lot to us to meet a B&H official after all. We learnt many things from discussions with him and we decided we're up to a fresh start, our men returned from the Army, others finished school, so things would get on the right track from then on.

We released our 4th issue, which featured interviews with local Timisoara chapter of Noua Dreaptă (mostly for the sake of skinhead unity before they turned gypsy on us) and

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English Rose, the latter was conducted by Flemish comrade D. whom we thank again! Also, there was an auto-biography by Tim Mudde (Brigade M), an article dedicated to nationalist World Box Champion Doroftei and the poster featured him, and of course the Skrewdriver series. The magazine is almost sold out when we type this report in.

Also we put out a tape and CD featuring best tracks of Brigade M from the Netherlands, also managed to play Brigade M on the radio, got them reviewed in non-movement music mags. and also got them on metal compilation along with non-political bands released by a local label. What better way to promote our ideology than getting people who are not into the movement to listen to our bands? We sold several tens copies and orders keep coming in.



All this time we managed to meet on a regular basis, sometimes even attend other nationalist and legionary organisations' events, where we successfully sold our products to the youngsters who were also present. Of course, some far-right wing nationalists didn't like us being there, feared they would ruin their reputation if associated with us "neo-nazis", and there were a couple of tensed up moments, but in the end they had to bear us ;-)

We made contacts with some of our neighbouring divisions in the first place, but also with others from far away. Most important was Cezar's trip to Ukraine team up with our neighbouring comrades, and even Poles and Russians (hello Denis & Kolja) therefore provide evidence of true white unity despite historical prejudice over territories. No matter the ongoing Zionist control in our nation states, we are but brothers and sisters of the same race and accordingly we share the same European homeland. Maybe someday skinheads from Hungary will also realize this.



Besides the usual skinhead propaganda, we started a campaign to aid unfortunate white families in Rumania and with help from local and foreign supporters, last Autumn we managed to make a few donations consisting mostly of warm clothes to families with lots



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of children and also history and movement books to village school libraries. Starting spring 2004, we will do a joint action with Women for Aryan Unity and we're hoping for great results.



That should sum it up. We're up to 10 full members and have a few probates. By the time you read this, we should also have our t-shirts out and we plan to release an "unfortunate Rumanian white children support" sampler, so we take this opportunity to ask bands world-wide to donate us a song. The profits will go to our children clothing fund. Also, family of Denis from Kolovrat will benefit from a small percent of the profits. So do get in touch and together we can make the 14 words real!

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THE NETHERLANDS

How much of what you had heard about Rumania's racial issue before visiting my country proved to be actually true?

Before I visited your country my opinion wasn't very good about Rumania. A lot of gypsies are making a mess from the country now at this moment, and because of the fucking commies in your country it was already a terrible situation. That was my personal opinion about it, not many National Socialist people, but in my eyes a lot of commie and gypsy haters. Now I visited your country and my opinion was right.

Do you think skinheads here stand any chance of making a change?

I think it is very difficult to be a skinhead in a country where are still many commies, but also a good point in your country is that because of them, there are also many people who think about the situation, so there is a very good possibility to have a good scene there, but there is really much work to do, but yes everywhere is a chance to make a change.

What sector of the movement here do you think we should work at first?

What I saw in your country is that most of skinheads live far away from each other, in most of the cities I

visited there are 5 or 6 people who are able to do something for the movement, so what's very important for you is the cooperation between those people, find in every active city a contact person, let all the so called contact people stay in contact with all of them, and after that you have little active groups, who can arrange their own things, begin with a meeting for all the active people in Rumania, so you can start with a group where everybody knows each other.



From what you saw here for yourself, are we off on a good start?

The people I know there now are on the good way yes, but there is too much work to do for the small number of people who are active.

Now then how hard was it for you to bring people together in the Netherlands, having to deal with competitors such as c18 for example?
